Reaching Out

From the Minister . . .

TWO DAYS HAVE PASSED since one man sought revenge and relief by shooting wildly into the pews of one of our Unitarian Universalist congregations in Knoxville, Tennessee. By doing so, he pierced hatred and horror into the one place that many of us have counted on to experience refuge, beauty, hope and love... a sanctuary.



What is perhaps even more shocking is that his destructive action occurred at 10:18 a.m. on a Sunday morning, during their worship hour, which that day happened to be an intergenerational production of *Annie, Jr.* This week and in the weeks to come, we are left with the task of beginning to comprehend the incomprehensible.

On Sunday afternoon, Rev. Chris Buice from the Tennessee Valley UU Church requested prayers for the members of his congregation, and so a few of us gathered in a circle of prayer, poetry and song in our own sanctuary that evening. The following is a glimpse into that healing circle and an invitation for all our members and friends to join in a widening circle of lament and grief, healing and praise.

Let us create a circle of lament to utter aloud our sorrow and our fear. How could another human being steal the lives of loved ones and the innocence of children?!... Don't those who spew rhetorical words of hate and division see how their words may translate in the hands of one who is capable of shaping them into deeds of deliberate destruction.... Why is it so easy to purchase guns and ammunition?

Let us create a circle of healing and praise. How very proud we are of the calm, caring, quick and heroic way in which the Unitarian Universalists responded to their being in danger.... How we know that our message of unity and love and a willingness to struggle for the rights and cares of all regardless of creed, color, gender, sexual

orientation, and physical and mental ability are more needed than ever.... How we stand in a long line of forefathers and foremothers who have dealt creatively and courageously with the religious callings of their time.

Let us create a circle to care for our wounds of grief and to honor the lives of those whom we have lost. We acknowledge our deep sadness at being targeted for our cherished beliefs.... We pay attention to the fact that this new grief can't help but connect with sorrows from our past and that we must take care of ourselves... And we hold the victims and heroes of this tragedy in our hearts, celebrating the meaning of their lives, and hoping that peace and courage will light the hearts of all those who are connected with them.

Will you join with me in holding the following victims and heroes and their families in your prayers, and please, add any other names or thoughts you wish.

In the coming weeks, take care first and foremost to nourish yourself, and then to reach out and be a healer in a world that is desperately in need of your gifts.

The President's Corner

I spent my Fourth of July weekend with the members of the Board and Alison at our Board retreat. It was time well spent as we became oriented with our Board roles, shared our expectations of each other by covenanting, did some visioning to lead us to our Board priorities for the year and, most importantly, shared some good food and good conversation as we learned about each other.

To start us on our visioning, we were asked the question: What would we like to accomplish this year with a one-year goal and a five-year goal? We broke down into two groups and worked on these two time frames. One group had difficulty getting past the one-year vision because it was of utmost importance to them, whereas the other group knew the one-year piece would get done and primarily visioned around the five-year question.

This was fascinating to me. I am so grateful that there are those who want to work on our immediate concerns for the upcoming year. Once they are resolved, they will lead to clarity around our long-term goals. Yet I am also thankful that there are others who believe that our short-term goals will be accomplished and are able to look at our long-term vision.

I want to share with you some of my favorites from these two conversations for our five-year vision: We will be a growing congregation that is diverse and inclusive.

We will be more engaged in our neighboring faiths. We will be a community. We will meet the needs of all age groups. We will raise UUs. We will be a movement. We will grow smaller as we grow larger. Our facility will reflect our values. We will minister from a place of health. We will make a notable difference in our members' lives so that they can make a difference in the lives of others.

The seven of us opened up our minds to our future possibilities. It helped us to see what we had in common and to embrace our different visions. When it was time to figure out our Board's one-year priorities, we broke down into two new groups. We came back with the same three priorities: Congregational Vision, Leadership and Committee Development, and Stewardship.

We have a history of shared ministry; thus we are asking you to be a part of our fact-gathering and decision-making processes. Come join us as we journey together and work on our short and long-term goals for our spiritual home.
