From the Minister...

I WANT TO SHARE A DELIGHTFUL TREND in our congregation. Several of our children and families have approached me about whether children younger than 16 can sign our membership book. The answer I have given is, "Yes, they can sign as junior members. When they turn 16, we hope they will feel the same way and we will welcome them as full members."



The age of 16 was chosen by our founders (and is an age frequently chosen by UU congregations) in order to emphasize that joining a congregation is a thoughtful and voluntary practice. Children are an important part of our community, and I am enjoying the growing number of junior members. The age of full membership commitment is offered when people have had sufficient opportunity to learn about us and can be invited and not coerced into agreeing with the seven UU principles and our congregation's goals, mission and covenant.

We are a voluntary association, and that is important to us. We are also democratic, which means that each member has the opportunity to help shape our community and our future together. We have a living, not stagnant, covenant with one another. This also means our congregation embraces the kind of change that makes us continue to be relevant in the spiritual lives of our members and friends, and our children and adults. Many of our core principles have withstood the test of time, but we have also adapted the way we implement them in our lives, in the congregation, and in the world.

Members, friends, and brand newcomers are invited to gather together on **Saturday, October 3, at 10 a.m.** or **Sunday, October 4, at 9 a.m. or 1:30 p.m.** to share our excitement for what is possible over the next five years. It is high time we do this, both because it's been awhile and because a large segment of our congregation is new and hasn't had a chance to join in such a process. Tillie-Jo Emerson, a trained strategic planning facilitator, will be leading us through a series of conversations that will spark all of our imaginations.

What have been the blessings of your involvement with our Fellowship? What might make your relationship

with us more fulfilling? How do we want to help deepen and grow what we offer in our shared ministries of worship, religious education, social justice, pastoral care, leadership development, stewardship and community fun?

Come prepared to share with an open heart and mind, ready to listen for the powerful hope, the caring change, the practical tweak, and the loving transformation found in one another's dreams. In all of our strategic imaginations, I know we will find kernels of wisdom and the popping of commitment from all of us that will lead to exciting places on the next five-year leg of the journey of the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship.

Albert Einstein once said, "Imagination is more important than knowledge. For while knowledge defines all we currently know and understand, imagination points to all we might yet discover and create." Come and share what you have stirring in your heart, in your gut, in your mind and in your dreams, and help others to do the same.

The President's Corner



Imagine!

What do you hear and see when I say that the Morristown Unitarian Fellowship is a **Church**? Do you see a vibrant community bonding together to help each other on their spiritual journeys? Do you hear the squeals of joy from the children on the playground and going to and from their Religious Education classes? Do you see a community that is dedicated to helping people in need, whether or not that need is financial, physical or spiritual? Do you hear the various members of our community as they give voice to the needs both inside and outside our community?

What do you imagine when I describe my Sunday morning experience as **worship**? Do you imagine the embrace of our community as it gathers to lift the spirits of each of our members? Can you imagine the transformational energy that we share as we gather in the sanctuary? Do you visualize a place of peace and gathering that can be intentionally sacred and has the power to comfort, to heal, to inspire and to entertain?

And if I say the word **god**, do you reject the premise, or do you allow its use to have meanings beyond the conventional, beyond the speaker's intent, but defined and accepted on your own terms?

Words Have Different Meanings

When I first came to Morristown Unitarian Fellowship, these words all had very different meanings for me. Some brought up feelings and images from past associates and life experiences that were painful or very negative. Some were "neutral" and conveyed no special meaning or power.

Over the years, I have taken back these words and

refined and redefined and re-imagined what these words could mean and do mean to me. Almost everything we say is interpreted in the context of when, where and how we say them. When I use these words in conversations both inside and outside of MUF, they now mean the same thing. I am aware that depending on the context, they may mean something subtly, or even radically, different to the listener. But at their core, they convey the same intrinsic meaning.

When I say a **church**, I mean a place of public worship, a place where a dedicated community gathers together to share their common, and uncommon, experiences. That may entail a structure, or it may not. Star Island is a church, to me. So is where our MUF community gathers.

When I say **worship**, I mean a time and space where I show and share my respect for my own spiritual practices and for the spiritual practices of others. It is a time when that which is sacred is honored.

When I say **god**, I am talking about my own evolving understanding of that which is not knowable. It includes the mysteries that cannot be solved, the rising of the sun, the cry of a new-born baby and the purring of a contented cat. I am fairly sure that I am no longer an atheist or a theist, even less sure that I am an agnostic, but I am more sure that I am an evolving polytheistic, Einstein-influenced, explorer of the scientific/mystical school of almost believers. I think.

Thank goodness we have a place like MUF, so we don't have to imagine that one exists.

They leave it up to older members to decide the future. Sometimes they complain about the decisions without ever having been part of the process. All members need to have a voice.

Our children will be part of a process of discernment concerning their future on Sunday, October 4, during a special Chalice Chapel. We hope that our

Senior High youth will come to the planning sessions. If you are a parent of a Senior High youth, please encourage them to attend. This could be an opportunity to talk with your youth about the importance of their faith of Unitarian Universalism.

There will be an opportunity to participate in the conversations on Saturday, October 3, at 10 a.m. Two opportunities to participate will be offered on October 4, at 9 a.m. and at 1:30 p.m.

Planning for the Future: A Five-Year Strategic Plan – Sign Up by October 2!

The Strategic Planning Task Force (SPTF) was developed by the Board late in 2008 and charged to guide the process of strategic planning for MUF culminating in a Five-Year Strategic Plan and in a plan that would lay the foundation for a Capital Campaign to implement the 5-year plan.

For many months the SPTF has met biweekly to prepare the way. They reviewed and assembled historic data about the Fellowship throughout its 50+ years. They researched, and in some cases interviewed, other UU congregations to learn from their experience and discover best practices. As part of their planning process, each of these congregations has adopted a 3-5-year Strategic Plan around which all of the congregation's activities and budgets are aligned. These strategic plans ultimately helped successful UU congregations achieve their vision AND raise the funds to do so.

Through its initial work, the task force recognized that MUF is particularly poised to tackle strategic planning at this time because of the success we have had, particularly the expansion of staffing through the call and hiring of a new Minister, Music Director, RE Director and Office Administrator. The members of the task force agree that our strategic plan must be built upon our history and recent successes.

During the weekend of October 3-4, the congregation will have its first opportunity to be involved in the Strategic Planning process. As part of a process based upon continuous congregational dialogue, the SPTF has developed an event to enlist involvement of the members and friends of the Fellowship. Every effort was made to design it to meet the needs of all – individuals and families alike. Three sessions have been scheduled so that you can pick the one that's most convenient for you.

What do you love about MUF? What would you like to change? Do you want to help shape MUF's future? Do you want to make sure that MUF is a place for you, your family and friends to thrive? How should we interact with the local and global community? All of these are questions that we all need to answer. The opportunity for doing that begins on October 3 and 4. Your insight, ideas and passion will form the foundation for our future. Together we will speak our values and use our shared commitment to set the future direction of the Fellowship.

In tough economic times like these, our faith may be shaken: faith in ourselves, faith in each other, faith in our way of life. We may be tempted to “go it alone” or we can pull together as a community and help one another.

This course, described in the *UU World* as a “Common Security Club,” offers the opportunity to join together as a community to discuss ideas and share resources in “a place where people . . . look at our real security in the fact of the economic crisis. It is part study group, part self-help and mutual aid group, and part political action group.” The curriculum is based on “the assumption that we need to prepare ourselves and our communities for . . . fundamental changes and a new economic model based on real wealth and economic activity. The good news is [that] there is a lot to build on; parts of our economy are healthy and vibrant. Should we succeed, our lives will be happier and healthier – and our economy will be fairer and more ecologically sustainable.”

After the Introductory session, to which all are invited, those committed to attend the remaining five sessions will form a cohesive group for further exploration of these issues.

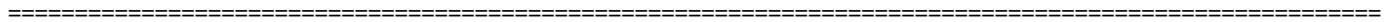

The Social Justice Council & the RE Program Children/Families invite you to help us prepare for a very special event – ***Harvest Day at MUF*** – that will take place on November 22 between services. The idea is to have a very successful ***food drive for 4 weeks leading up to Harvest Day*** – when we all will gather in the Terrace Room and ask families and all members to “assemble” and “decorate” a box/basket that would be filled with foods (both staples and items suitable for a Thanksgiving Dinner, but canned/boxed, as donation gifts to be given out by the Morris County Interfaith Food Pantry. “Pathways to Work” (PTW) – Look for the Workers in Yellow Caps–at the Morristown Train Station ...or RESERVE AHEAD.... Go to www.pathways.to.workers.org or call 973-647-8495- Rosa Chilquillo Coordinator. Hard-working, strong, very willing people need your household maintenance jobs. Think about **how you can give work to a person who is trying to earn their way, every day, the hard way.** Our workers are registered, have ID’s, and are self-organized to distribute work fairly to each other. The Job Bank is available to receive your job request by contacting Rosa Chilquillo at **973-647-8495.** The referral service is open, to phone in job postings and to dispatch of workers. Here, you can hire skilled or unskilled workers for daily work– painters, gardeners, carpenters, masonry workers, etc. Unskilled labor is paid \$10- \$12 per hour (we suggest providing lunch) and skilled/specialty workers earn more. Negotiations are between the employer and the employee, but translators are available to make communication more comfortable. Housekeepers are available to clean homes and offices. (Or you may go down to the Morristown Train Station, anytime, and talk to the workers with the “Yellow Caps.”)

Water Shortages Seen in Four Years

A Scottish Proverb states that "We'll never know the worth of water till the well go dry."

This proverb will prove true in the near future.

Consumer Reports predicts that almost 4 out of 5 states anticipate water shortages by 2013 which could lead to steeper rates and penalties for excessive usage.

Now is the time to begin conserving water by stopping drips, insulating the water heater, installing low-flow showerheads and adding aerators to faucets. Such changes could easily save \$350 in water bills a year.

There is a finite amount of water on the earth that has been recycled since the earth was formed. The amount of water is the same but the population growth and demands on the supply of water has grown exponentially, especially in the last two centuries. Conservation efforts will help preserve our precious resource and keep our "well" from going dry.
